PHILADELPHIA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HELD AT NEW YORK October 2, 3, 4, 5, 1787

"The first church in New York queried: Whether a person applying to one of our churches for admission as a member, and satisfies the church that he has been previously baptized by immersion, on a profession of his faith in Christ; but at the same time confesses, the person who administered the ordinance was, at the time, nither ordained to the work of the ministry, nor baptized himself by immersion, but only chosen and called by a religious society to officiate as the teacher or minister, should be received.

"Resolved, That the above query be held over on consideration till next Association, and that our brethren Holmes, Ferris, S. Jones, D. Jones, or any of the brethren, who choose to engage in it, be requested to deliver their thoughts in writing, upon the subject at the next Association."

PHILADELPHIA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HELD AT

PHILADELPHIA October 7, 8, 9, 1788

"In answer to a query from the first church in New York, of last year, held over to this time, respecting the validity of baptism, administered by a person who had never been baptized himself, nor yet ordained; we reply, that we deem such baptism null and void:

"First, Because a person that has not been baptized must be disqualified to administer baptism to others, and especially if he be also unordained.

"Second, Because to admit such baptism as valid, would make void the ordinances of Christ, throw contempt on his authority, and tend to confusion: for if baptism be not necessary for an administrator of it, neither can it be for church communion, which is an inferior act: and if such baptism be valid, then ordination is unnecessary, contrary to Acts 14:23; I Tim. 4:14; Titus 1:5, and our Confession of faith, Chapter 27.

"Third, Of this opinion we find were our Associations in times past; who put a negative on such baptisms in 1729, 1732, 1744, 1749 and 1768.

"Fourth, Because such administrator has no commission to baptize, for the words of the commission were addressed to the apostles, and their successors in the ministry, to the end of the world, and these are such, whom the church of Christ



History

Archaeologists Uncover Ancient Dead Sea Farm

EIN BOKEK—An archaeological excavation on behalf of Tel Aviv University led by Dr. Mordechai Gihon, archaeologist and military historian, has uncovered a Jewish farm from 70 C.E. and a Roman fortress dating from 350 C.E. Dr. Gihon told the press that the farm, which extended over a distance of three kilometers and was 400 metres wide, belonged to the royal household of King Herod and was operated by tenant farmers. Its main products were balsam and various spices, which were mentioned by Plinius and Josephus Flavius.

The farm was destroyed in the year 70 by Jewish rebels because the tenants were suspected of collaboration. The skeleton of a man was found there, with a Titus coin on each eye, and a Bar Cochba coin on the ground next to him. Also found there were agricultural implements made of stone, wood, bronze and iron.





the Carmel Mountains and the majestic loop of the seacoast that swings from the south of the city to the jutting tip of Lebanon to the north. The golden beaches of Haifa stretch out between these.

Solomon sang of the beauty of this place, (Song of Solomon 7:5) and Isaiah wrote of the excellency of Carmel, (Isaiah 35:2). Standing here we viewed for miles and miles the beautiful Mediterranean Sea and the mountains of Lebanon.

We descended from the mountain into the Valley of Jezreel and Esdraelon. On the western slopes of this valley is the mound of Megiddo a place where many battles have been fought through the centuries of time. On the east are the hills where Gideon won his battle against the Midianites, (Judges 7:15-25). Also Mt. Gilboa is there where Saul fought his last battle and took his own life, (I Sam. 31:1-6).

We then journeyed south to Caesarea where Peter preached to the household of Cornelius, (Acts 10 and 11). The old Roman Theatre is here and we sat down while a quartet composed of Bro. Dariel Meador and wife. Betty Sue: Sister Rebecca McDonald and Bro. Glen B. McCurry went to the far side and sang a number of hymns. The sound was wonderful here in this open-air theatre and we discussed the possibility of coming back for a singing later, but did not get to work this into our schedule. We then traveled back to Jerusalem for the night.

Saturday. November 13, 1976. Today we were to tour the city of Jerusalem which meant we would ride very little and would be walking most of the time. A book could

be written with scriptures given on what we visited and saw on this day, but for the sake of space I must briefly give an account of today's activities.

We went to Calvary where Jesus was crucified. What an experience! We visited the Garden Tomb, the place of Jesus' burial and resurrection. We conducted a devotional service here with ministers in our group participating. The day continued as we went to the Judgment Hall, Mt. Moriah where Solomon's Temple stood, and to Mt. Zion, the city of David. We visited the Wailing (Western) Wall and back to our hotel. The rest of the day was spent relaxing, eating, and walking through shopping areas. However, the Jewish shops did not open until 6:00 p. m. They were closed at 6:00 p. m. on Friday as this was the Jewish Sabbath. We spent another night in Jerusalem at the St. George Hotel.

Sunday. November 14, 1977. We boarded our bus early and headed down the Jericho road toward the Dead Sea. On this beautiful Sunday morning we had our service on the bus which included scripture reading, prayer, singing and testimonies. This was a wonderful experience, worshipping in the Holy Land!

We came to the Dead Sea and then traveled southward to Masada the mountain-top fortress where the 960 Jews had out against the Romans in 73 A. D. It took several hours going onto this mountain, viewing it with the background history being explained by the Jewish guide, and then descending back into the valley to make our trip over to the desert city of Arad where we had our Sunday dinner of chicken, dressing and the usual trimmings

After eating we went to Beersheba the home of Abraham for sometime (Gen. 21:33-34). From Beersheba we went by Hebron back to Jerusalem. After supper we had a Sunday night singing in the lobby of our hotel and then retired for our last night in the Holy Land. (To be continued)

PEARL BUCK AND LIVING BIBLE

The New Evangelicalist Tyndale House of Wheaton, publishers of the Living Bible, have just published a huge 536-page volume designed to sell millions of copies to children, entitled "The Story Bible".

The author is the noted Pearl Buck, who died on March 6, 1973 after publishing 85 books and winning the Pulitzer and Nobel prizes. When she died, according to the Cakland Tribune: "There was no religious service and no minister, just a brief eulogy..." She was a very liberal missionary in China who was the storm center of Presbyterian missions in the modernist-fundamentalistcontroversy.

In Harpers magazine for January 1933 and in the Cosmopolitan magazine for May 1933 she wrote articles in which she expressed serious doubt about Christ's existence, but still confessed that she was enamored of the concept of the life of Christ. She was the arch enemy of J. Gresham Machen in the Presbyterian struggle for the Faith. He listed her as Exhibit A of the apostasy in the Presbyterian church USA. Dr. Ned Stonehouse's biography of Dr. J. Gresham Machen quoted Pearl Buck's words on page 473: "But above all, let the spread of the spirit of Christ be rather by mode of life than preaching. I am weary unto death with this incessant preaching. It deadens all thought, it confuses all issues, it is producing in our Chinese church a horde of hypocrites and in our theological seminaries a body of Chinese ministers which makes future." one despair for the

Read I Corinthians 1:17-21. One cannot imagine anyone with greater contempt for the historic Christian Faith as revealed in the sacred Scriptures than Pearl Buck whom Ken Taylor has elevated to a place of great honor before the children of this century. This is a public repudiation of the authority of the Scriptures. Gal. 1:6-9; II John 9-11; Titus 3:10.
