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

HOMOSEXUALS

THE FIRST TWENTY FIVE YEARS A History of Fairview Missionary Baptist Church. By: Pastor Bernard M. Skaggs Aug. 29, 1976

On Oct. 15, 1950 Elders L. W. Smith and H. C. Vanderpool went into the town of Woodburn in south Warren county, Ky. to hold a two-week revival meeting. They were permitted to use a theatre building for two weeks. The results of this meeting were very good, there being seven souls saved.

After this meeting Eld. Smith began to preach there once each month. After a few months of preaching there a need was felt to organize a church at this location. A Methodist building was found to meet in and a date was set to meet and organize. Sister churches of the area were invited to send their ordained help to assist.

The organization was held on April 27, 1951. The organizing council was made up of twelve ordained preachers and four deacons from ten churches. The churches represented in the council were; Drakes Creek, Fifth Street (now Fairview Memorial), Meadorville, New Bethel, Union Hill, Siloam, Plano, Mt. Zion, Bays Fork and Salem. Eld. L. W. Smith was elected moderator; Eld. D. C. Russell, clerk; Eld. W. T. Russell to preach the sermon; Eld. L. A. Stewart to read the articles of faith, Eld. H. C. Vanderpool to read the church covenant; Eld. F. L. Ray to pray the prayer and Eld. Lloyd Fishburn to give the charge to the new church.

After the council had performed its function and the new church had declared itself an independent Baptist body, Eld. L. W. Smith was elected pastor and Bro. C. E. Taylor was elected clerk. The name Fairview Missionary Baptist Church was adopted.

There were seven charter members with letters of good standing from four different churches. The charter members were; Sis. Henretta Belcher and Bro. C. E. Taylor from Fifth Street; Sis. Mallie Russell from Hillsdale; Sis. Diasey Johnson from Mt.

Zion, and Sis. Gladys Perry, Sis. Leana McPeak and Bro. B. McPeak from Old Union. Three of these are still members here at Fairview. They are Sis. Gladys Perry, Sis. Mallie Russell and Sis. Daisy Johnson.

The new church met once a month for some time then went to twice a month. In Nov., 1965 she started full time. This church still meets each Sunday morning with Sunday School and preaching and each second Sunday night for preaching and business conference.

In the past twenty five years she has had seven pastors; Eld. L. W. Smith, Eld. Wm. Johnson, Eld. C. B. Huddleston, Eld. Jimmy Suttle, Eld. Junior Farley, Eld. Earl Patterson and Eld. Bernard M. Skaggs. She has been served by three clerks; Bro. C. E. Taylor, Bro. O. L. Gregory and Bro. J. B. Clark. Those presently holding offices in the church are as follows: Deacons, Brothers Robert Pirtle, J. B. Clark, Obie Cothron, Aubrey Johnson, Ernest Sanford and James Combs. Trustees are Bros. Herman Clark. J. B. Clark and Ottis Gammon. Bro. J. B. Clark is the clerk, Bro. Ottis Gammon is treasurer, Bro. Robert Pirtle is the Sunday School superintendent and Eld. Bernard M. Skaggs is the pastor.

This church has baptized 55 converts and has over the years furnished a spiritual home for 133 of God's children. She has a present membership of 70. In 1951 and 1952 she represented in the Wiseman Association and was a constituent member of the Siloam Association. She has represented in this association each year since. She was also host church to this association in 1959.

She has been faithful in keeping house for the Lord and in upholding His truths. For the past 25 years she has "earnestly contended for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints". (Jude 3.) It is our hope and prayer that she will continue to do so in the years to come. And when the Lord returns will be found still preaching and practicing the truths as laid down in His Holy Word.
