Polycarp organized the Partus Church at the foot of the Tiber in 150 A.D. (Cyrus' Commentary of Antiquity, p. 924.

Tertullian was a member of the Partus Church and he organized the Church at Turan, Italy in 237 A.D. (Armitage Church History, p. 182).

Tellestman from Turan Church organized the Pontifossi Church at the foot of the Alps in France in 398 A.D. (Newlin's Church History, Vol. 2, p. 318).

Adromicus came from Pontifossi Church and organized the Darthea Church in Asia Minor in 671 A.D. (Lambert Church History, p. 47).

Archer Flavin came from the Darthea Church and organized the Timto Church in Asia Minor in 738 A.D. (Mosheim's Church History, Vol. 1, p. 394).

Balcaleo came from the Timto Church and organized the Lima Piedmont Church in 812 A.D. (Neander's Church History, Vol. 2, p. 320).

Aaron Arlington was ordained by the Lima Piedmont Church in 940 A.D. (Jones' Church History, p. 324) and he went and organized the Hill Cliff Baptist Church in Wales, England in 987 A.D. (Alex Munston's Israel of the Alps, p. 39) also (A History of the Baptists, John T. Christian, pp. 182-183).

The Baptists of Wales increased and through Baptist missionaries the work spread throughout Wales and from these Welsh Baptists came many of the Baptists in America. (History of the Welsh Baptists, J. Davis, pp. 5-158).

In June, 1701 in the counties of Pembroke and Carmarthen, Wales, sixteen Baptists were constituted into a regular Baptist Church with Thomas Griffith as pastor. They set sail from Milford in church capacity on the ship William and Mary and landed at Philadelphia on September 8, 1701, where the "church emigrant" went ashore on American soil. In 1703 they purchased 30,000 acres of land from William Penn in New Castle County, Delware, and gave this new purchase the title Welsh Tract, and soon they were settled, giving their church a permanent home, from which it took the name of Welsh Tract Baptist Church. (History of the Welsh Baptists, J Davis, pp. 72-73).

The Welsh Tract Baptist Church was one of the five churches in the constitution them to attend. Let us pray for this work. of the Philadelphia Baptist Association on July 27, 1707. (History of the Baptists, Benedict, pp. 605-606).


From the Philadelphia Baptist Association came Baptist pastors and missionaries into the south organizing churches and then constituting them into Associations. The Charleston Association was constituted in 1751; the Sandy Creek Association was 1758; the Kehukee constituted in Association was constituted in 1765; the Ketokton Association was constituted in 1766. (A Short History of the Baptists, H. C. Vedder, p. 318).

From these churches came Baptist ministers into southern Kentucky and Middle Tennessee organizing churches. The first association in Middle Tennessee was the Mero District Baptist Association constituted in 1796, of five churches. Some of those ministers organizing the Red River Baptist Church in 1791, and later (White's Creek) now New Bethel in 1794, were Daniel Brown, Joseph Dorris, Nathan Arnott, Patrick Mooney, Ambrose Dudley, John Taylor and Joshua White. Both Red River and New Bethel were in that first association. Joshua White was the first pastor of New Bethel Baptist Church which was organized in 1794. (History of the Baptists, Benedict, p. 799; Early Tennessee Baptists, O. W. Taylor, pp. 98-99).

Joshua White the pastor at New Bethel, having come from the Fishing Creek Baptist Church, Kehukee Association, in Halifax County, North Carolina, began some labors in Sumner County, Tennessee from which El Bethel Baptist Church was organized in 1796. (Twentieth Century Baptists, Vanderpool & Russell, p. 300).

From El Bethel Church the Dixon Creek Baptist Church in Smith County, Tennessee was organized on March 8, 1800. History of Middle Tennessee Baptists, J. H. Grime, pp. 354-355).

From Dixon Creek Baptist Church the Hillsdale Baptist Church, Macon County, Tennessee was organized on July 16, 1817.

From the Hillsdale Baptist Church the Liberty Baptist Church, Macon County, Tennessee was organized on November 2, 1822. (History of Middle Tennessee Baptists, J. H. Grime, p. 338).

From the Liberty Baptist Church the Lafayette Missionary Baptist Church, Lafayette, Tennessee was organized in 1849. (History of Middle Tennessee Baptists, J. H. Grime, p. 362).

From the Lafayette Missionary Baptist Church an arm was extended to Denver, Colorado for a Mission. Through the labors of Elder Ottis L. Jones from the Lafayette Church, the Mission was organized into the Colorado Missionary Baptist Church, 5900 South Parker Rd., Denver, Colorado, on Sunday, September 28, 1980.

BAPTIST CHURCH ORGANIZED IN DENVER, COLO.

Beginning on page 1, and concluded on this page is an article tracing Baptist History from Jerusalem to Denver, Colorado. Elder Ottis L. Jones, a member of Lafayette Missionary Baptist Church, Lafayette, Tenn. in 1979, went to Denver where he began doing mission work. During the past several months ten were received into the Lafayette Church through the extended arm. With Elder Jones and wife, the ten, a total of 12, were granted letters from the Lafayette Church for the purpose of organizing the mission into an independent church.

Ministers, deacons and others with their wives traveled from Tennessee, Indiana and Missouri to Denver for the work there on the last weekend in September. On Friday night, Sept. 26, Elder H. C. Vanderpool preached at the mission and on Saturday night, Sept. 27, Elder A. G. Gregory preached.

On Sunday, Sept. 28, 1980, at 10 A.M. services began at the mission located at 5900 South Parker Rd., Denver. Elder D. C. Barton preached. A presbytery was organized for the purpose of organizing the new church. Eleven churches in Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana and Missouri were represented by 13 ministers and three deacons.

Elder D. C. Barton served as moderator of the presbytery and Elder Don Curtis served as clerk. It was voted to let the sermon by Bro. Barton be the organizational sermon. The Articles of Faith were read by Elder Terry Foster and Elder W. E. Massey read the Church Covenant. A set of rules proposed by the mission was read by Elder Bobby Gann. All these were adopted by the 12 members of the proposed organization. Elder Richard Huskins prayed the organizational prayer. After a new Missionary Baptist Church had been declared scripturally organized, the Bible was presented to it by Elder Calvin Perrigo. After the minutes of the work were read and approved, the presbytery was dissolved.

The new church was called into business order. The name chosen for the body was Colorado Missionary Baptist Church. Elder Ottis L. Jones was elected as pastor. Sister Doreen Brown was elected

churches that had a special need, like he wrote to the Corinthians to correct some errors. Peter's letter is filled with great doctrinal, as well as practical lessons. And it is my desire and purpose to bring to the attention of the reader these great truths. It is not my intention to go into this verse by verse, but what I want to do is point out the various good doctrinal and practical subjects for preaching. I would advise you to read and study this great book for yourself, study it prayerfully, and try to see all the richness of its content.

FIRST CHAPTER

Immediately following Peter's greeting he plunges right into the great subject of regeneration: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which according to His abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection from the dead." I Peter 1:3. This subject, regeneration, would remind us of a principle that should take top priority in any man's preaching; and that is the subject of evangelism. Because this is the first thought given in the commission. TEACH, MAKE DISCIPLES. (Matthew 28:19.)

Without preaching of the Gospel there can be no regeneration, and this means we have to evangelize, because people are born again by the Word of God. "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which liveth and abideth forever." I Peter 1:23. The Word of God is His instrument to bring conviction to the hearts of sinners; it is the sword of the Spirit (Eph. 6:17); it is the Gospel of our salvation (Eph. 2:13); it is the Gospel of the grace of God (Acts 20:24). No Gospel preached, by faith, for faith cometh by hearing (Romans 10:17); no faith, no regeneration, or new birth, for it takes the seed of the kingdom to produce this new life which is in Christ Jesus.

EVANGELISM PRACTICED

1. Going to where people are, not expect them to come to us. God has given the Word and we are supposed to take it to the people; 2. Be prepared when we go, have something to tell, have a message from the Word of God; 3. Depend on the Lord, not on the arm of flesh; 4. Use some common sense when we approach people, what you want is their attention, we must get their mind before we can get to their heart; 5. Pray and trust the Lord to bless His Word, don't worry yourself to death about God's part.

Evangelism Throughout The Bible

The first Gospel message ever preached was delivered of God Himself in the Garden of Eden. "And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; It shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise His heel." Genesis 3:15. This verse is both prophetic and evangelistic, it points forward to the coming of the Messiah, the Seed of the woman. This is prophecy: It shall bruise the serpent's head, and that is evangelism. Any preacher can from all sin." I John 1:7; This doesn't leave preach an evangelistic message from this text in Genesis 3:15.

God Himself preached another Gospel message in the Old Testament which I should bring to your attention: "And I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee; and in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed." Genesis 12:3. God was speaking to Abraham here and telling him that through his seed all families of the earth would be blessed. He Bible.

was looking beyond Abraham's national seed, which would be as the stars of heaven and the sand on the sea shore, he was referring to the One Seed, the Messiah, the Christ, the Saviour of the World. Because as we note in the Galatians 3:16: "Now to Abraham and his seed were the promises made, He saith not, And to seeds, as of many; but as of one, And to thy seed, which is Christ." So the seed He told Abraham about was the Christ. And in this way He, God, preached the Gospel unto Abraham. "And the Scripture foreseeing that God would justify the heathen by faith, preached before the Gospel unto Abraham, Saying, in thee shall all nations be blessed. Galatians

Some people would have you believe that the first Gospel message was preached by the apostle Peter on the Day of Pentecost, but I think the above scriptures tell us differently. The first Gospel message was preached by God Himself.

The Blood of Christ in Evangelism

Peter makes this point in this first chapter of his first epistle; "Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers; But with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot." I Peter 1:18, 19.

If we leave out the blood of Christ in our preaching we ignore the scarlet thread that runs throughout the whole Bible. All the blood that was shed from the time that Abel offered his lamb till all the many thousands, yea, millions of animals were offered by the Jews under the Law pointed to that sacrifice that Jesus, the Lamb of God, made on the cross. Peter, in the verses above, gives a negative and positive side of the issue. He tells how we are not redeemed, not by silver and gold, not purchased with anything earthly, but with the precious blood of

Redeem means, primarily, to buy back, as from the slave market. This is what Jesus did, He bought us back from slavery, he paid the terrible price there on Calvary to set the captives free. Paul said, "Ye are bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." I Corinthians 6:20. So our messages to the world must be centered in and around the sacrificial death of Christ, for this is evangelism, and it is what sinners must hear before they can be saved. This Bible subject is far different from the social gospel that we hear so much of today, which is not in reality the Gospel, but is just a vain attempt to change men's lives without God's precious means, that is, without the precious blood of Jesus Christ. "Without the shedding of blood is no remission." Hebrews 9:22; without the blood there is no forgiveness of sins, "In whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace.' Enhesians 1:7: without the blood there is no cleansing from sins and its stains, "The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us any sin to be cleansed by any other means. such as baptism, church membership, good works, etc.; without the blood of Christ there is no washing such as the Bible declares: "Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood. Revelation 1:5. May we again be reminded that in our preaching that we must not leave out the scarlet thread that weaves its way throughout God's precious old Book, the (To be continued)


