Isaiah 9:1-7

- 1 Nevertheless the dimness shall not be such as was in her vexation, when at the first he lightly afflicted the land of Ze-bu-lun and the land of Naph-ta-li, and afterward did more grievously afflict her by the way of the sea, beyond Jordan, in Galilee of the nations.
- The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined.
- Thou hast multiplied the nation, and not increased the joy: they joy before thee according to the joy in harvest, and as men rejoice when they divide the spoil.
- 4 For thou hast broken the voke of his burden, and the staff of his shoulder, the rod from the foundation of the world,

of his oppressor, as in the day of Midian.

- For every battle of the warrior is with confused noise, and garments rolled in blood; but this shall be with burning and fuel of fire
- 6 For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace.
- 7 Of the increase of his government and his peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this.

INTRODUCTION

From Genesis to Revelation, regardless of the Biblical subject, directly or indirectly, the theme is our Lord Jesus Christ, the Saviour of the world. Then in the last book of the Bible we have John telling us that Christ is the Lamb of God which was slain Revelation 13:8.

GOD'S JUDGMENTS UPON IMPIETY AND INJUSTICE

The prophet Isaiah had written of the declining interest of the Jewish people in God and his work. The captivity was sure to come. Even Moses the leader of this great people from Egyptian bondage, had warned them far in advance, that a turning away from the true and living God would bring judgment.

What nation in the world can we look at today this is following the same pattern? Since God is a God of justice, and since he is no respector of person, if judgment came upon Israel for their way of living, can America escape?

Like you had there in Tennessee and Kentucky, and in many other places, we also had a very hot and very dry summer this year in our part of Japan. A lot of things happened like earthquakes, floods by a few, attack of typhoon, eruptions of volcanos, but thanks to God, He protected His children. We are all right and are doing all right for His glory day after day

here in Japan, for which we are thankful to the Lord. Now we have good weather. My family and I are just fine and are keeping on the work for the Lord.

Let me tell you some of things we had in our serving the Lord. (I wish I could tell you all of them.) About two weeks ago I had a phone call from unknown person by name of Mieko Nishizawa whose 10year-old son had a trouble with brain lumps. Before I could meet him, he died suddenly. Thursday morning of that week I was at the city crematory to preach to a few people gathered to the furnace where the boy was about to be cremated into ashes within 20 minutes. It was a sincere time that only the truth was required. If you had been there, you would have felt what was life in the different way you haven't thought of.

The Buddhist priests and their co-operated funeralists would charge her at least more than four thousand dollars to do the funeral for the boy. They are greedy and covetous. This separated and tired woman had no help and no money, and didn't know what to do. Her beloved ones have ignored her and her son because her marriage was considered as improper. I told her not to worry anything, but trust the Lord and have peace with God. We will have a funeral in our church house and you don't have to pay us anything, not even a penny. I suggest you call your parents and tell them your son

Saturday of that week a lot of flowers were brought into our small church house. Many telegrams of sympathy arrived. Her old mother and father, her sisters and brothers, her old friends of her home town came all the way from Takamiya by chartered bus, of which this lonely hearted woman had never thought. It was a beautiful reconciliation. There were tears of sorrow as the boy died, but more than that, there were tears of joy, joyous tears of reconciliation. I preached on repenting their sin and trusting Jesus Christ, on reconciliation


Our 1983 Tour was a wonderful trip, great experience, and fellowship. (See page 8.) We had 93 tour members including 14 Baptist ministers.



LIGHT PROMISED TO THOSE IN DARKNESS

"And when they shall say unto you, Seek unto them that have familiar spirits, of for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." and unto wizards that peep, and that mutter: should not a people seek unto their God? for the living to the dead? To the law and to the testimony: if they speak not according to this word, it is because there is no light in them. And they shall pass through it, hardly bestead and hungry: and it shall come to pass, that when they shall be hungry, they shall fret themselves, and curse their king and their God, and look upward. And they shall look unto the earth; and behold trouble and darkness, dimness of anguish; and they shall be driven to darkness." Isaiah 8:19-22.

You see in the above words of the Lord that trouble, darkness, anguish and hunger would be upon the people, but "nevertheless" it would not continue. So often when we have spoken to people in sorrow or trouble, we would endeavor to give them a ray of hope by pointing them to the Lord for their comfort and help.

In former times, "at the first" contempt had been brought on the land of Zebulun and Naphtali in the deportation of their inhabitants under Tiglathpilser, when he carried them away into Assyria. II Kings 15:29. Yet, there was to come, light and hope to these people. Let us notice our entire lesson as we bring these events together.

In the beginning of our lesson we note the areas of Zebulun and Naphtali were beyond Jordan in Galilee. To this area honor was to come, and that with light to the Gentiles. "Galilee" that is, "region of the Gentiles." The word "Galil" in Hebrew means a "circle" or "circuit" and from it came the name Galilee. North of Naphtali, inhabited by a mixed race of Jews and Gentiles the bordering Phoenician race, Judges 1:30; I Kings 9:11. Besides the recent deportation by Tiglathpilser, it had been sorely smitten by Benhadad of Syria, 200 years before, I Kings 15:20.

************ It was after the Assyrian deportation colonized with heathens, by Esar-haddon, II Kings 7:24. Hence arose the contempt for it on the part of the southern Jews of purer blood, John 1:46; 7:52. The same region which was so darkened once, shall be among the first to receive Messiah's light. Let us

From that time Jesus began to preach, and to say, Repent: Matthew 4:12-17.

THE PRINCE OF PEACE

Certainly, before Jesus came into this region preaching the gospel of the kingdom, other prophecies concerning him must needs be fulfilled. For this we shall study the last three verses of the lesson text.

In verse 6, a promise is made that a child is to be born unto us. He is a gift! John 3:16: II Corinthians 9:15.

The child that was to be born is called Wonderful. There are many wonderful people in the world. There are many wonderful things in God's creation. However, there has never been any thing or any one as wonderful as Jesus! So, to call him Wonderful is a name that divine inspiration gave to him.

He is called Counsellor. A counsellor is • a person who counsels, or advises. Again, we think of all the counsellors in the world. Teachers by the million, millions of lawyers, ministers, social workers, government employees, etc., yet, no counsellor ever walked the face of the earth, that could give the advice and proper teaching that Jesus · did!

The child was to be called The mighty God. Since it would take not only a few pages, but many volumes to go into this point of doctrine, we must here give only a scripture that plainly reveals this fact to us. When the angel appeared to Joseph announcing the coming birth of Mary's son, he said, "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS: for he shall save his people from their sins. Now all this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, (Isaiah) saying, Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us." Matthew

He is called The everlasting Father. Jesus said during his ministry, "I and my Father are one." John 10:30

Then Isaiah continues, And his name shall be called..."The Prince of Peace." From the beginning of time, mankind has had problems, contentions, wars, etc. And, therefore, has desired peace. From the Bible and history books, we learn that peace has come to individuals or to nations, many times. Yet, war would again come and the experience of fightings, death destruction would be felt. the angel said to the shepherds in the valley just below Bethlehem, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." When Simeon came to the temple eight days later at the circumcision of Jesus, he said, after holding the baby in his arms, "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word:" Jesus said during his ministry to a sinful woman, "Thy faith hath saved thee; go in peace." Luke 7:50. Just before he went back to heaven he said, "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace." John 16:33a. While there are hundreds of scriptures in the Bible that teach the eternal security of the believer, none are any stronger than the one in our lesson, "Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end." There is no end to the peace that God gives to a born-again child of God!

Bad Weather Stalls Search for Ark

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI) — Rotten weather forced James
Irwin to call off an air search for Noah's Ark on eastern Turkey's Mount Ararat, but the former astronaut hopes to try again today.

Irwin, who lost all but three teeth last week in a fall on the mountain, flew instead to Ankara, Turkey's capital, yesterday to thank Turkish military leader Gen. Kenan Evren for allowing the U.S. expedition. "I feel much better," Irwin said when asked how he's doing since he spent 18 hours unconscious. Only three of the expedition's 11 members reached the 16,946-foot peak in their search for the remains of the Ark, and most of the group were in Istanbul yesterday for a breather.

PLANTS OF THE BIBLE

Many names of plants growing in the Holy Land during Bible times present little or no difficulty for the translator, for they clearly refer to the plants or the close relatives of the plants that are growing now in our own temperate regions. The almond is an example of this. Others, however, still elude the systematist, their origins lost in antiquity.

Algum Tree, Juniperus excelsa Bieb (ălgûm, Heb. 'algûmmîm), now known as Grecian juniper, it reaches a height of 65 feet and is pyramidal in shape. It is abundant in the mountains of Lebanon and Gilead. The wood was eminently suitable for King Solomon's Temple (II Chron. 2:3,4,7-9).

Almond, Amygdalus communis L. (à'mund, Heb. shākedh, to watch for), belongs to the peach family and blooms very early; its pink blossoms appear before the leaves. It blooms prematurely when budded branches are placed in water in a warm place. The Israelites adopted the almond flowers with their sepals and petals (knops and flowers, Exod. 25:33-36) for the ornamentation of the cups of the golden candlesticks.

Almug Tree, Pterocarpus santalinus L. F. (ăl'mug, Heb. 'almuggim, wrought wood), a tree providing a sweet-scented timber which is black outside and inside a ruby red. It is a native of India and takes a high polish. It is known as red sandalwood. The wood is strong and so antiseptic that it is insecticidal. King Solomon's builders undoubtedly deliberately selected the wood of the almug tree for the pillars of the temple because of its specific qualities of strength, beauty, and long life (I Kings 10:11,12).

Aloes (OT), Aquilaria agallocha Roxh (ăl'ōz, Heb. 'āhālīm, aloes), a large and spreading tree known as eagle wood or lign aloes. The inner wood of the tree, particularly when in a state of partial decay, is fragrant (Ps. 45:8).

Aloes (NT), Aloe succatrina Lam (ăl'ōz, Gr. alóe), a member of the lily family, this plant has a cluster of thick fleshy basal leaves which contain aloin, a substance which, dissolved in water and added to myrrh, was used by the ancients in their highly perfected art of embalming (John 19: 38-40).

Amomum (Gr. ámomum), an odoriferous plant or seed used in preparing precious ointment (Rev. 18:13, not found in KJV). The exact species is not known. It grew in Armenia, Media, and Pontus, with seeds in clusters like grapes (Pliny, Hist. Nat. 12.28).

Anise, Anethum graveolens L. (ăn'is, Gr. ánethon, dill), an annual, weedy umbellifer which grows like parsley and fennel. Wrongly translated anise, this plant was cultivated for its aromatic seeds, which records tell us were subject to tithe (Matt. 23:23).

Apple, Prunus armeniaca L. (ăp'l, Heb. tappûah). Much discussion has taken place over the "forbidden" fruit of the Garden of Eden (Gen. 3: 3-13) as well as the true botanical nature of the "apple" in the numerous other references. The western "apple" did not thrive on the soils of ancient Palestine. Modern writers seem to concur in the opinion that the apricot is the only fruit meeting all the requirements of context. The apricot tree is a shade tree nearly 30 feet in height. Its fruit is regarded second only to the peach; its perfume strong and revitalizing.

Apples of Sodom, mentioned by Josephus (BJ, IV, 8.4), but it is uncertain to what he refers.

Aspalathus, Convolvulus floridus L. F. (ăs-pă-lā'thūs, Gr. aspālathos), a thorny, woody shrub bearing flowers similar to its morning glory-like relatives. Both the flowers and the wood are aromatic (Eccl. 24:15).

Balm (balsam), Commiphora opobalsamum Engl. (bam, Heb. tsŏrî, balsam), the gum or thickened juice from the balsam trees believed to be the true balm of Gilead indigenous to Arabia (Ezek. 27:17).

Balm, Balanites aegyptiaca (L) delile (bam, Gr. resin or gum, Heb. tsőrî). The balm here recorded is the false balm of Gilead. It is the juice of a small tree growing in abundance around the Dead Sea. It was used as a healing salve (Jer. 51:8).

Barley, Hordeum distiction L. (bar'le, Heb. se'ōrân, long hair, Gr. krithé), a grain cultivated for man and beast from remotest antiquity. It is considered to be the most universally cultivated cereal. Barley bread was a staple food of the Hebrews and a symbol of poverty and scorn (Hos. 3:2). Barley corns were used by the Hebrews as a unit of measure.

Bay Tree (Green Bay Tree, q.v.)

Bdellium, Commiphora africana (Arn.) Engl. (děľ'·ĭ-ŭm, Heb. bedhōlah), a tree that grew eastward of Persia. From its incised bark oozed a gum which when dry became transparent and wax-like and looked like a pearl (Num. 11:6,7).

Beans, Vicia faba L. (ben, Heb. pôl, bean), the broad bean, extensively cultivated in Palestine. Dried ground beans were mixed in with grain flour to make bread (Ezek. 4:9). A staple article of diet for the poor of Palestine.

Bitter Herbs (Herbs, q.v.)

Box Tree, Buxux longifolia Baiss (Heb. te'ashshûr, ashur wood), a hardy evergreen forest tree of Lebanon and northern hills of Palestine. Because of the hardness of its wood it was used to provide inlays for cabinet work (Ezek. 27:6).
