A VOICE CRYING IN THE WILDERNESS

By Elder Eugene Brown Indianapolis, Indiana

Matthew 3:3: For this is he that was spoken of by the prophet Esaias, saying, The voice of one crying in the wilderness, Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.

INTRODUCTION

Christ's mission on earth was to be two-fold. First, to establish a visable church (of which He was to be the foundation), second, He would save his people from their sins. If He were to build a house He must have the material. This house was to be a spiritual house. The acorn is planted that grows into a tree that produces the lumber that will be taken on locality to be used as part of the house.

Likewise, John the Baptist was a forerunner of Christ. He was to prepare the material that Christ would use to go into his church. The manner in which John, the forerunner, came into the world, (his dress and his ministry) should be carefully noted. His clothing was very simple, just a girdle. His food was very simple, locusts and wild honey. He had no beautiful church with heat and airconditioning or padded pews. Rather his ministry was out in the wilderness. It is rather doubtful that a simple dressed person like John the Baptist would be welcomed to preach in our average

church today. We must keep in mind that John the Baptist was a Holy Ghost baby.

As a forerunner, John was to "make ready a people" and not stones, like you would gather to build a natural building. This building was to be a spiritual building. Christ's kingdom was to be a spiritual kingdom. John's ministry was very short while here on earth. He lived to accomplish his mission and finally to be beheaded simply because he had told a man it was not lawful for him to have his brother's wife.

THE MISSION OF JOHN THE BAPTIST

The mission of John the Baptist is mentioned in all the Gospels. One point must be noticed that has a spiritual meaning. The glory of God is revealed in the person of the son. The "wilderness" can represent the whole race of mankind, alienated from God and in a corrupt nature.

In order for that highway to be made straight, the first thing is every valley shall be lifted up. Are there not dark places in our human lives that may be described in these terms? God wills that the valley itself shall be lifted up. "Every mountain and hill shall be made low, the crooked shall be made straight." In spiritual things there must be a willingness. When He finds a heart open to receive Him, and humble spirit, He will never withhold the full disclosure of His love.

The rough places must be made plain, at whatever cost. Until that work is accomplished, we cannot know the deep peace of a redeemed and sanctified child of God.

EVERY VALLEY SHALL BE EXALTED

How does Christianity remove those mountians, fill up valleys and give a straight pathway? Heathen religions divide society into sections. Christianity reveals one God, the father of all, by whom are all things and to whom are all things. A God for common people awakens a community of love, purpose and worship. We have a common God for a common people and a common salvation.

You know there is an element of people that feel they are too low and have just gone too far in sin to ever be saved. In offering or presenting the plan of salvation, it is somewhat like building a road. Behind a house that I once lived in, they were building a new road. There were a couple of large hills that had to be brought down and there were a couple of valleys too low that had to be brought up. So you find people that feel too conceited to have to bow. So this kind must be humbled. The person that feels too far gone, he must be lifted up. We are all on the same level with God. We all have to come the same way to find him.

THE UNIVERSAL REVELATION

Never has there been such glory as in the mission of the son of God for the redemption of sinful men. The glory of every divine perfection was manifested in the mission and work of the son of God. 1) Wisdom - I Tim. 3:6; I Cor. 2:7. 2) Power - I Cor. 1:24. 3) Holiness and justice - Ps. 53:5; 10-12; Ps. 22:1-3.

EVANGELISTIC REPORT

Dear Brother Vanderpool,

Listed below is a complete and up-to-date report of the full time Evangelistic work that we have been engaged in for the last (16) sixteen months.

I appreciate so much having the Baptist Banner as a means of keeping our people informed of the work that our churches are doing.

The work has carried us into eight states, and we have driven some forty thousand (40,000) miles.

We have attended 320 services, preached 176 times, worked in 23 revivals, witnessed 30 Professions of Faith, and witnessed 33 Unite with Old Time Missionary Baptist Churches.

Our Financial Report is as follows:

Average monthly income from churches, direct support \$540.49 Average monthly income from individuals 266.20 Average monthly income from revivals and appointments 404.40 Total average monthly income (sixteen months) \$1,211.09

Total average monthly expenses (sixteen months) \$1,268.19

Our expenses have been \$57.10 more per month than our income. We have borrowed some money so as to continue in the work

My wife and I have lived in the 1966 motor home while on the road and have pinched pennies so as to make ends meet.

Our plans are to continue in the work as we are burdened for lost souls. These last few months have been very burdensome but the Lord has walked every step with us.

We again want to thank every church and individual who has helped us to reach lost souls through this ministry.

If any church or individual should see fit to help us continue, it would be greatly appreciated.

At present five (5) churches have become regular monthly supporters of the work, a total of approximately \$375.00 per month.

During the month of October we will be in two revivals: October 9th, Kokomo Missionary Baptist Church, Kokomo, Indiana; October 24th (Monday night), McAuley Chapel Community Building, Buena Vesta Road, Huntingdon, Tenn.

May God bless each of our Old Time Baptist Churches and keep a good Missionary spirit working among us all is our prayer.

After reading Bro. Swanson's letter, I remembered a report that was made at the Old Union Baptist Ministers School in Bowling Green, Ky. last year. It is as follows:

What do we have? We have listed five Missionary Baptist Associations with a total of 113 churches. Those churches reported a total of 383 ministers in their membership. Those churches were being served by 98 ministers. When we subtract these from the 383 reported we see that 285 men who have been told that they were called of God to preach the gospel do not pastor. We have churches from the east coast to the west coast, and from the north to the south begging for ministers to come and preach for them!


