

MISSIONS SEMINAR

As was announced in this paper, Fellowship Missionary Baptist Church in Indianapolis, Indiana hosted a series of meetings referred to as a Missions Seminar. The following is a report on the context of these meetings. Twenty churches were represented in these meetings arriving from eight different states. Also there averaged 21 preachers at each session, which will prove the desires of God's called preachers to advance the Gospel message along with their respective churches.

On Friday night July 29, 1983, the first meeting began with good singing and humble prayer led by Elder Lewis Holland. Elder Calvin Perrigo followed with preliminary remarks concerning Fellowship church's action taken in conference to host these meetings, the purpose for these meetings, and selection of preachers to speak. 

Another work of the church is to discipline those who are her members, Matt. 18:15-17; Rom. 16:17; I Cor. 5:9-13; and the following: "Now we command you, brethren, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye withdraw yourselves from every brother that walketh disorderly, and not after the tradition which he received of us." II Thess. 3:6.

The church is to be the light of the world, Jesus said, "Ye are the light of the world." Matt. 5:14a. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your father which is inheaven." Matt. 5:16.

MISSIONS SEMINAR (Continued from Page 1)

Hicks, pastor of Bethel Missionary Baptist Church in Toledo, Ohio. Brother Hicks had the subject of "Revealing Church Doctrinal Errors through Historical Evidence." This was one of two topics under the main Title of "Re-establishment of Bible Truths and Doctrines." Brother Hicks began by explaining how and why history is useful to us; the Bible itself being a history. Brother Hicks then proceeded to speak about how the fundamentalist doctrine had eroded sound Baptist doctrine in Baptist churches. He first remarked that we usually have no problems with other denominations who do not claim to be Baptists; but we are in serious jeopardy due to the abundance of so-called Baptist churches and their deceiving influence. Here are two of the questions Brother Hicks asked while in this portion of his subject, "Why do you need to begin a new Baptist Church? Why not just join one of the numerous Baptist churches in the community and work with them?" He then began to answer these questions by showing us through documented histories, and famous writings of well-known evangelists where error had crept in.

Through the use of a color chart, Brother Hicks clearly exposed how "Fundamentalism" had its origin, how it had progressed throughout the years, and infiltrated and corrupted Baptist movement. He began with explaining the "Prophecy Revival of the 1790's," showing us how they erroneously calculated the date of the Pope's exile from Rome to predict the return of Christ.

Brother Hicks then followed on into an in-depth discourse on the "J. N. Darby Dispensationalism" revealing the influence Darby had on Fundamentalism. He also told us how some of Darby's views have been advanced through the well-known reference Bible by C. I. Scofield. His next discourse was on the "Prophecy and Bible Conference Movement" and its impact on organized religion. From these conferences arose a very prominent man by the name of D. L. Moody, a popular non-denominational evangelist. Brother Hicks explained that it was Moody who originated "The Inquiry Room," a room isolated for those who were seeking relief from sin where Moody's followers would deal with them privately seeking to obtain a profession.

Due to the length of his subject, he was not at liberty to get deeply involved with the remainder of his topic, but concluded briefly mentioning how Liberalism crept into the theological seminaries of this country and became the root cause of many churches failing to maintain the old paths.

After a song, the next speaker was introduced, Elder Jerry A. Reynolds. His subject, "Gaining Confidence of People on the Mission Field," was the second part under the Title of "Re-establishment of Bible Truths and Doctrines." Although Brother Reynolds said he knew of no special way, or secret method that could be used to gain confidence of people, he did reveal the only way possible anyone could influence another was through the power of God's Holy Spirit. In Brother Reynold's message, he emphasized the importance of prayer to the missionary on the field. Then he told us that the missionary must first be sure God wanted him in His work - so sure that there would be no doubt. He then expounded on the slow nature of mission work by using the work's of Judson as an example showing that Judson's first convert came after six long years. He told us the source for all answers is God. God can supply the things we lack in winning people over and can educate us on the methods which will work best in any particular area. We were also instructed on the importance of becoming a native, loving the people, and going to stay. There is no turning back for the man of God, whom God sends to the field. Brother Reynolds taught us to be versatile and also taught the importance of involvement in an intense personal work which may mean learning to preach to one person. He used scriptural backing on this part of his message citing Acts 20:20, "And how I kept back nothing that was profitable unto you, but have shewed you, and have taught you publickly, and from house to house."

In his closing statements, Brother Reynolds stressed the importance of being patient, warning the missionary not to overload his listeners with too much doctrine but to proceed with a little at a time. Finally, remain optimistic, knowing God is in the work and God does not fail.

Upon the conclusion of Brother Reynolds' message, there followed a song and Christian handshake towards Brother Hicks and Brother Reynolds. The services closed for that evening after many wonderful talks.

The Missions Seminar resumed the next day at 2:00 P.M. Elder John Thompson had been selected as the first speaker on the subject of "Church Responsibility toward the Missionary." Brother Thompson spoke on Prayer & Communication of the Church toward the Missionary. Many people are not acquainted with Brother Thompson, however, he was well qualified to speak on the subject being presently involved in mission work in Brownstown, Indiana under the authority of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church in Columbus, Indiana. Brother Thompson reiterated a few of the things that Brother Reynolds spoke on concerning the benefit of prayer and also expressed his experience of being called into the mission field, revealing a few of the circumstances that followed. He then spoke on how the church shared in the work showing the need for the church to check up on the missionary, inquiring of his needs, and to see how the work is progressing. Brother Thompson told us it would be difficult to separate his subject from the portion that Brother Roark would speak on following him. Nevertheless, he pointed out that even though financial support was very important, visitation to the mission field by representatives of the supporting churches was equally important. He illustrated his point by mentioning how the people who attend his mission sometimes ask why the people of the churches who send money do not come to visit them.

Elder Vernon Roark then followed with his portion of this topic, "Finance & Fellowship." Brother Roark took a reading lesson from Eph. 4:1-13. He then began to expound on the scriptures establishing his thought based on "The Work of the Ministry." He showed that the work of the ministry is not in the hands of the preachers, but was in the church. He went on to establish the nature of an "active scriptural church" emphasizing the "active" part. He further explained through the example of a healthy body and how to attain one is through a balanced diet and vigorous exercise, that a strong and healthy church must also be fed a balanced diet on the word of God and that exercise itself through evangelism and missionary work. Brother Roark expounded on the various gifts that are given in the ministry and their proper uses.

All of this he used to found his subject on the necessity of doctrinally sound churches and their support of missions and missionaries. He told us that through organization, dedication, and communication our churches could properly finance missions. Brother Roark proved his concept of organized financial aid in I Cor. 16:1-4. He pointed out that the word churches is plural and further stated that they united their finances to help the poor saints at Jerusalem. Another scriptual reference used was in II Cor. 11:8, where Paul said to the church at Corinth, "I took wages from other churches, to do you service." Although he did not have the time to spend on communication as he wanted, Brother Roark easily proved through the scriptures the importance of communication through the letters sent by Paul recorded in I and II Corinthians and Ephesians, plus others. Brother Roark concluded by stating that our churches are not taking full advantage of our young preachers by giving them the opportunity to exercise the God-given abilities by helping in revivals. He noted that too often our churches call the

most popular and busiest preacher they can find. Furthermore, too often they will take a pastor away from his church when many young preachers are readily available and need the experience.

After a two hour recess in which the sisters of Fellowship Church supplied us with a bountiful meal, Elder J. Henry Smith spoke to us on the subject of "Preparation For and Doing Mission Work." Brother Smith began by warning us against too much zeal and not enough preparation. He used as a basis scripture found in Gal. 1:15-18 where Paul tells of his call into the mission field. He told us of the period of time Paul spent in Arabia and his return to Damascus where Paul then spent three years. Brother Smith pointed out that God prepared the Apostle Paul for his work over a long period of time. He also used for an example Moses and that it was forty years before God allowed him to lead his people out of bondage. Brother Smith also recounted many personal experiences concerning his call into the mission field. He spoke to us of three things involved in preparation: First, the missionary is to surrender to the Lord to do his work which includes self-denial and following the Lord; Second, the missionary must have a very good knowledge of the scriptures and through preaching have the ability to exalt Jesus Christ; Third, the missionary should become acquainted with the churches by visiting them and telling them what God has called him to do and what his plans are, then ask for their prayers.

The last portion of Brother Smith's message was on "Doing Mission Work." He told us we must put into action what we have prepared to do. He showed by the example in the 13th chapter of Acts the involvement of the spirit of God dealing with the missionaries and the church and that the church sent them out. The missionaries as they went preached the Gospel of Jesus Christ which is what they were sent to do. Brother Smith spoke in his message that as the missionaries preached, people were being saved, and they did according to the Commission, they made disciples, baptized them, and taught them to observe all things that they had commanded. They organized churches and ordained Elders to carry on when they left. Brother Smith concluded his message.

Following Brother Smith's message, all the preachers in attendance were asked to come forward and everyone extended to them their hands in Christian fellowship. Many people expressed their sincere thanks to God for allowing them to attend the service. All together I'm sure everyone who was there departed having been edified, educated, and uplifted to the extent of greater zeal to do God's work through mission efforts. The only regrets expressed was that more of God's people would show their interest and concern towards missionary work. Perhaps more churches will see the need and host a similar series of meetings in the future.

dread behind us; but there are some things that we must give serious consideration to, it is not something that God would have us to rush right into without any preparation. We don't know all of what is ahead of us, but God does, and He wants us to be prepared for whatever comes. So sometimes God lays a restraining hand upon us to hold us back for a while until we are better experienced in God's ways and have a better knowledge of His Divine Word.

THE PREPARATION FOR THE WORK:

First of all, the would-be missionary must make a complete surrender to the Lord to do His work, or another way to put it is, **DEDICATION.** We have won a great victory when we have, by the grace of God, come to the place where we can make that all-out surrender. SELF-DENIAL, laying all things aside at home, however precious, and this may take a little time, and a lot of prayer; yes, and a lot of soul searching. But if we would go wherever the Lord wants us, and stay as long as He wants us to, we had better just lay our all on the altar, and let Him guide us and do what He wants to do with us. Here is what Jesus said about self: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." Matthew 16:24. The man who is called of God to go into some destitute field, maybe some foreign country, he begins to think about the discomforts it will bring to his wife, if he is a married man, or to his children, if he has children; or just leaving his home with its comforts and conveniences. Well, you have to lay all this on the altar, deny self of what is near and dear to us and let the Lord take care of the result. "Take up your cross, and follow me," Jesus said.

In order for us to have the Holy Spirit to work and let us know just what He wants, we must of necessity be surrendered to the work He has called us to. It takes a lot of His grace, it requires being close to the Lord. So I cannot stress too much the thought of us giving ourselves completely to the Lord, and saying as Isaiah did, "Here am I, send me." Isaiah 6:8. The prophet said this after he had had a great experience with the Lord, the presence of the Lord was very, very real. See Isaiah 6:1-8.

Secondly, the man whom God is calling to go as a missionary must inform himself in the Word of God. I wouldn't say that he has to have a degree from some seminary, but he does need a pretty good knowledge of the Scriptures; he needs this, of course, to preach the Word faithfully, and he will have some pretty hard questions to answer also. A good, solid foundation of Gospel preaching must be laid, for this is His means of bringing conviction to sinners, and it pleases God to save sinners through preaching. "It pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe." I Cor-

In preaching we must exalt Jesus Christ, we must lift Him high, for He is the Saviour and man's only hope of glory. "But we preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews a stumbling block, and unto the Greeks foolishness; But unto them which are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the Power of God, and the wisdom of God." I Corinthians 1:23,24. The missionary will come face to face with the old religions of the world, with all of their ignorances and idolatory, so we must be prepared to show such people the much, much better things of Jesus Christ, and we should do this with some tact.

Thirdly, the would-be missionary should acquaint himself well with the churches, he should visit churches and tell them what God is calling him to do and what his plans are; because he is going to need their prayerful support, and he will need financial support, if he is giving himself and his all to do missionary work. I am not saying that he should go around soliciting funds, but he will need to visit the Lord's churches and let them know of his burden and what he intends to do about it, and very important, ask for their prayers. I believe that the Lord will see that he gets support, if he is sincere and is in the will of the Lord.

************ IERICHO

The Site. Jericho, also called the city of palm trees (Deut. 34:3) is located five miles west of the Jordan and seven miles north of the Dead Sea, some 800 feet below sea level. Its climate is tropical, with great heat during the summer. In the winter it becomes a resort for people fleeing the colder weather of the Palestinian hill country. In ancient times date palm trees flourished here, and balsam, from which medicine was extracted, was the source of great income. Today there are many banana groves. The presence of springs of water makes the

locality a green oasis in the middle of the dry Jordan rift

Jericho in the Bible. Jericho first enters the Biblical story when it is captured by Joshua and the invading Hebrews as the opening wedge of their campaign to take Canaan (Josh. 6). The city's location made its capture the key to the invasion of the central hill country. It was regarded as a formidable obstacle by the Hebrews, requiring divine help to take it. After the two spies had searched it (Josh. 2) Joshua led the Hebrew forces against the city, marching around it daily for six days. On the seventh day they circled it seven times, then shouted and blew their trumpets and "the wall fell down flat, so that the people went up into the city, every man straight before him, and they took the city" (Josh. 6:20). The city was devoted to God, totally destroyed and burned, except for metal objects found in it (Josh. 6: 17-19). Only Rahab, who had cared for the spies, with her family, was saved (Josh. 6:22, 23,25).

It is mentioned in connection with Elisha's ministry (II Kings 2:5,19; see also II Chron. 28:15; II Kings 25:5; Jer. 39:5; Ezra 2: 34; Neh. 3:2, 7:36).

In the time of Christ, Jericho was an important place yielding a large revenue to the royal family. Since the road from the fords of the Jordan to Jerusalem passed through it, it became a stopping place for Galilean pilgrims to Jerusalem, who came south through Perea to avoid defilement by contact with the Samaritans. Thus Jesus passed through it on a number of occasions. Nearby are the supposed sites of His baptism (in the Jordan) and His temptation (the hill Quarantania, west of the city). Near the city Jesus healed Bartimaeus (Mark 10:46-52) and two other blind men (Matt. 20:29-34). Here occurred the conversion of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10), one of the most graphic of the Gospel narratives. In the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37) the traveler was attacked as he was

DOING MISSION WORK:

This is the end we must have in mind, **DOING THE WORK THAT GOD HAS CALLED US TO DO.** The call from God is very important, the preparation is very important, but we must act to the call, and go and put into practice what we have been preparing for, just preparing will not do the job.

We have a beautiful example in the 13th chaper of Acts of Bible missions, of how the missionaries were set apart by the church at Antioch, and how they went out and did the work. The Holy Spirit said to the church at Antioch, "Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them." Now, the Lord had a work for these men to do, He called them to do just that, and He spoke to a New Testament church to set these men apart for this work, "And when they had fasted and prayed, and laid their hands on them, they sent them away." Acts 13:2,3.

First, Paul and Barnabas were set apart by a local, New Testament church for the work whereunto the Lord had called them (Acts 13:2,3), no other institution was involved in their being sent.

Secondly, the missionaries were being directed by the Holy Spirit as they went. "So they, being sent forth by the Holy Ghost, departed unto Selecia; and from thence they sailed to Cyprus." Acts 13:4. The Holy Spirit was their only Director, He was the One on whom they leaned for Power and direction.

Thirdly, they went and preached the Gospel, for this is what they were sent to do, "And when they were at Salamis, they preached the Word of God in the Synagogues of the Jews." Acts 13:5. They witnessed to one individual on this island of Cyprus also. Acts 13:6,7. We are not to wait till we have a big crowd before we start preaching.


Fourthly, the missionaries, after they had preached and people were saved, established churches and confirmed them in the Faith. They didn't just get people saved and then let them go, they did according to the Commission, they made disciples, baptized them and taught them to observe all things that they had commanded (Matthew 28:19,20). When Paul and Barnabas were at Lystra the Jews persecuted them and they stoned Paul and left him for dead, but he rose up, and they went to Derbe and preached, "And when they had preached the Gospel to that city, and had taught many, they returned again to Lystra, and to Iconium, and Antioch, confirming the souls of the disciples, and exhorting them to continue in the Faith, and that we must through much tribulation enter into the kingdom of God. And when they had ordained them elders in every church, and had prayed with fasting, they commended to the Lord on whom they had believed." Acts 14:21-23.

going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, a winding road, often passing between crags, going through the desolate Judean wilderness, which was a frequent hiding place of criminals.

Of greatest interest to the Bible student is the evidence bearing on the overthrow of the city in the days of Joshua.

NT Jericho, Tulul Abu el-Alayiq, was excavated in 1950. Much of it had been built by Herod the Great as his winter capital. Here Herod died (4 B.C.). It was a magnificent Roman-style city, with pools, villas, a hippodrome and a theater. A great civic center, of the best Roman masonry, with a grand facade containing statuary niches, potted plants and a reflecting basin before it, bear witness to the grandeur of the

international culture that was Palestine's during the time of Jesus.
