THE DEATH OF MRS. PRAYER MEETING

Mrs. Prayer Meeting died recently at the First Neglected Church, on Worldly Avenue. Born many years ago in the midst of great revivals, she was a strong, healthy child, living largely on testimony and scriptural holiness. She soon grew into worldwide prominence, and was one of the most influential members of the famous church family.

For the past several years, Sister Prayer Meeting has been in failing health, gradually wasting away until rendered helpless by stiff knees, coldness of heart, inactivity and weakness of purpose and willpower. At the last, she was but a shadow of her former self. Her last whispered words were inquiries concerning the strange absence of her loved ones, now absent from her presence, busy in the marts of trade and places of worldly amusements. Her older brother, Brother Class meeting, has been dead for many years. Experts, including Dr. Works, Dr. Reform, and Dr. Joiner, disagreed as to the cause of her fatal illness. They administered large doses of organization, socials, contests and drives, but to no avail. A postmortem showed that a deficiency of spiritual food, coupled with lack of faith, heartfelt religion deficiency, shameless desertion and nonsupport were contributing causes.

Only a few were present at her death, sobbing over memories of her past beauty and power. Carefully selected pallbearers were urged to tenderly bear her remains away, but they failed to appear. There were no flowers. Her favorite hymns, "Amazing Grace" and "Rock of Ages," were not sung. Miss Ima Modern rendered "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" but no one seemed to have any idea where this Isle might be. The body rests in the beautiful cemetery of Bygone Glories awaiting the summons from above.

In honor of her passing, the church doors will be closed on Wednesday nights, save on the third Wednesday of each month, when the ladies' Pink Lemonade Society serves refreshments to the men's handball team.


The climate here has had some adverse affect on us since we came, but we are becoming more adjusted to it. Our place is close to the ocean, and there is a lot of moisture in the air which is not good for sinus trouble and my ear trouble, and Annie Laura's arthritis. We have been looking out for a place farther from the water, but places are hard to find. So if we have to stay here we will try to put up with it. We took a trip to Palmdale, up in the edge of the desert, the other day to see how that would affect us. The air is dry there, of course, but very windy, and that isn't too good. We enjoyed our trip, the beautiful scenery but not the strong wind, you can't even keep your hat on your head. So we stayed over one night and came back home. Palmdale is about two hours' drive from Ventura.

We are enjoying our work at Nyland Missionary Baptist Church; there are just few in attendance, but the few seem receptive and devoted to their church. The most we have had on a Sunday morning is twenty. Three of those who were visitors on that Sunday morning were Spanish Americans, I suppose of Mexican extraction. There is a large population of these people around the church, and if they will come to church, well and good. It doesn't make any difference with me about the color of their skin; I would just be delighted at any time to preach to them. Most Mexicans are of the Cathlic faith, but if they will come to church I will be more than glad to preach the pure Gospel to them.

Please remember to pray for us and for those who come to hear the Word of God. If sinners don't hear the Word, how can they believe? "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." Romans 10:17.

We plan to come home sometime in August, perhaps the latter part. While home I want to have surgery on my hand where there are growths that are drawing two of my fingers down into the palm. We might have to stay for a month on this account. So we ask for your prayers as we make this journey. We are truly thankful for the churches and friends who have remembered us since we came to California. We have received many encouraging letters, and we like that. Our financial needs are being supplied. Thank the Lord for so many dear friends!
