




However, to our surprise, we all could understand one to another. It was by christian love and spirit under the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

Last Friday we had another guest from America. Bro. John R. Blalock of Portland, Oregon, whom we know for years, was a missionary to Japan, came to see us. We were glad to see him again. He brought us a message in Japanese language Sunday morning i.. Koi Church. was such a powerful and heart-touching sermon. We had two professions of faith that morning. Mrs. Kojima, school teacher, and Bro. Hatta's wife, Hideko, for whom we have prayed for a long time. Mrs. Kojima was just full of tears when she showed herself to the public. (I had a phone call from her this evening that she was just happy of her salvation in Christ, so she wanted to tell me again of it). How nice! We enjoyed the fellowship with Bro. Blalock. He went back to Yokohama "uesday morning to stay some days and then go home in Oregon.

We are glad souls being saved, and get baptised. And those Baptist people stay faithful to the Lord. Here I would like to mention a fact that you have a part of those convertors. Amen! We praise the

My family and I are fine and doing fine for His glory, for which we are thankful unto the Lord. We have hot summers, yet we keep busy in the Lord work. Just after writing this letter, I will leave my home and drive all night to Yumori which is 600 kilometers away. (We had a Wednesday evening Bible Class and prayer meeting tonight. It was good). What's In A Name?

In recent years, much to do has been made concerning the use of the term. 'Missionary,' as it is used in the name of Baptist Churches. The organization known today as, 'LAFAYETTE MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH,' was constituted in 1849 and the original name was, 'THE UNITED BAPTIST CHURCH OF CHRIST AT LAFAYETTE.' The first time that the term, 'missionary,' is found listed in the name of the Church, is found in the minute book dated, 'Saturday before the Third Lord's Day in November, 1888. For some months prior to this date the term 'UNITED,' had not been used consistently. Some months the clerk wrote, 'The United Baptist Church of Christ,' and other months he simply wrote, 'The Baptist Church of Christ.' But on the date listed above, without any action by the Church to authorize either the discarding of the term, 'United,' or the addition of the term, 'Missionary,' the clerk used the following words as a heading for the minutes. I quote, 'We the misenary Baptist Church of Christ in Lafayette, met on Saturday befor the third Lord's day in November, 1888.' In January 1889, he used the term, 'missinary.' The next month, Feb. 1889, he simply stated, 'The Baptist Church of Christ.' The next two months he used the word, 'missionary,' and then in May, 1889, he once again used the word, 'UNITED'. Thus we can see, that over a period of time, the prefix was gradually changed from, 'UNITED,' to, 'MISSION+ ARY,' and this without the authority of the body. The same thing is true of the words, 'of Christ.' Through a gradual process they were droped off and the name of the Church simply evolved into the present name 'LAFAYETTE MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH'.

The exact date on which the Church was organized is not known. A statement dated, June, 1854, which I shall quote following the, 'Rules of Decorum,' will explain why there is no date and month listed at the organization. From the Church minute book, I quote.

'Be it remembered that, William Weaver, Maragaret Wilkinson, M.N. Alexander, Minerva C. Alexander, J. B. Short, Martha Short, Susanah Short, Darius Buckley, Rebecca Buckley, Rubin Ragland, Warrist Jones, all regular members of the Baptist Church at various places, and being citizens of and in the vicinity of Lafayette, in the county of Macon, and State of Tennessee, and desirous of

organizing themselves into a Church at Lafayette, and that fact being made known to Rev. D. Smith and Rev. Wm. C. Bransford, both regular ordained ministers of the gospel in the Baptist Church. And by the request of the aforesaid Brethren and Sisters, the said ministers, on the......day of, 1849, met with said Brethren and Sisters at the Courthouse in the town of Lafayette, Macon County, Tennessee, and then and there organized a Church which was stilled, 'THE UNITED BAPTIST CHURCH OF CHRIST AT LAFAYETTE.' And some time afterwards, in the same year, Rev. Daniel Smith was chosen pastor and the following principles were adopted for the government and constitution of the Church.

- 1. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God and the only correct rule of faith and practice.
- 2. We believe in the fall of Adam and the

imputation of his sin to his posterity and corruption of human nature.

3. We believe in one only true and living God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

4. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the righteousness of Christ imputed to

them, and that good works are the fruits of faith and follow after justification, and only justify us in the sight of men and are evidence of our Graceous State.

- 5. We believe that God has ordained the preaching of the gospel as means in his own hands to save them who believe, and that he chooses and calls men to preach his gospel.
- We believe that the saints will persevere in grace and never fall finally away.
- 7. We believe that there will be a resurrection of the dead and a general judgment and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
- 8. We believe that the visible Church of Christ is a congregation of faithful persons who have obtained fellowship with each other and have given themselves up to the Lord and one another having agreed to keepup a Godly disciplin according to the rules of the gospel.
- 9. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great Head of the Church and the government is with the body.
- 10. We believe that water baptism and the Lords Supper are ordinances to be continued by the Church of the Lord until his second coming.
- 11. We believe that true believers are the only proper subjects of Baptism, and that

immersion is the only proper mode. 12. We believe that none but regularly Baptized Church members have a right to commune at the Lord's table.

(RULES OF DECORUM)

- 1. Church meeting shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any member provided the chair be filled but shall not vote unless the Church be equally divided and then he may give the casting vote.
- 3. Only one member shall be entitled to speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the moderator, he shall strictly adhere to the subject in debate and in no wise reflect on the person who spoke before him.
- No person shall speak more than three times on any one subject without leave of the moderator.
- No member shall absent himself from the Church without leave therefrom.
- 6. No member shall address another by any other appellation than Brother.
- 7. The moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking unless he breaks the rule of decorum.
- 8. A majority shall rule in all cases except in the reception of members, in that case unaminity is required.
- 9. All motions made and seconded shall be received by the Church before debate, and be put to vote after debate unless withdrawn by mover.
- 10. Any member violating the above rules knowingly and willfully shall be reported or such other steps taken as the Church may think proper.

Bro. D. Smith remained pastor of the Church until June, 1854, when he resigned his pastorship and the Church chose the Rev. Wm. H. Madox as pastor. During this time some members have been dismissed by letter and some received by letter, and some by Baptism, and as this history of the origin and progress of this Church is adopted from memory, there having been no Church record kept until this time. This record being adopted on the First Saturday in November, 1854.
