MISSIONARY REPORT FROM JAPAN

Hiroshima, Japan Oct. 22, 1971

Dear Elder Vanderpool and Readers.

It is always our privilege to be remembered in your prayer and in financial help. We surely appreciate the "Baptist Banner" and letters from friends in States as well as from Baptist churches and Baptist Sunday Schools.

My family and I are fine and doing fine for His glory here in Japan. Now it is Fall. We have fine weather. We enjoy it so much. At this time I recall good memories of God's loving people and their hearty fellowship I had when I was in your country three years ago. Letters from you relive me the perfectly wonderful days I enjoyed with them. So it is always our joy when we come to prayer remembering our co-workers deeply in our hearts.

Last week we had revival in Koi Baptist Church, Hiroshima. Lord had been with us and helped our missionary work for Him. For a month proceeding our evangelical meetings, we had concentrated our work for this purpose. I visited 3,500 houses myself bringing them christian literatures, tracts, and invitation handbills. Our Baptist fellows visited 1,500 houses after their job on week days, and on Sunday we did together. That covered 5,000 houses in house-jammed area, yet that still a part of this city. That was some hard work, yet we were happy in the service telling others of Christ.

We didn't have so many oppositions as we did have last May from our enemies of Christ. One night I saw two men by chance who were about to destroy one of our signboards which was on way side. I said, "Nani shite masuka?" which means "What are you doing?". They, one of them seemed about 45 years old and the (Continued on page 3)

(Continued from page 1) on June 19, 1966, Old Union Church extended an arm to this area for a Mission to operate under her authority. Those who had become members of Old Union and living in the Carthage area were authorized to buy land and build a house for the Mission.

On Oct. 16, 1966, Old Union granted their pastor, Elder H. C. Vanderpool, the permission to come to the Mission each second and fourth Sunday nights of each month to preach. The first revival held in the new building began on Oct. 30, 1966.

Services continued as have been mentioned and on Sunday, April 23, 1967, under the authority of Old Union Church the Mission was organized into a church with twelve charter members as follows: Charlie Hughes and wife Lorene Hughes, daughter, Holly Hughes; Frank Paris and wife, Lorene Paris; Fite Hughes, Sr. and wife. Marie Hughes; Eugene Agee and wife, Elizabeth Agee and daughter, Sherry Beth Agee; Fite Hughes, Jr. and wife, Cristel Hughes.

Eleven churches in Tennessee and Kentucky were represented in the organizational council by 26 ministers and deacons. There were twelve charter members. The present membership is 32. All the church property, land and building, is debt free.

Pastors: Elder Kenneth Massey, July 1967-Dec. 1970; Elder Thomas Carter, Jan. 1971 to present.

Clerk: Fite Hughes, Jr. - 1967 to present.

Treasurer: Eugene Agee, 1967 to present.

Sunday School Supt.: Frank Paris, 1967 to present.

The church has three deacons. They are Charlie Hughes, Eugene Agee, and Fite Hughes, Sr.

Since the beginning of the work in the tent 18 souls have been saved.

BACKGROUND HISTORY OF CALVARY

John was one of the twelve Apostles baptized by John the Baptist and a member of the church Jesus organized 30 A. D., Luke 6:12-13; I Cor. 12:28.

John baptized Polycarp on Dec. 25, 95 A. D. (Neander's Church History, p. 285).

Polycarp organized the Partus Church at the foot of the Tiber in 150 A. D. (Cyrus' Commentary of Antiquity, p. 924).

Tertullian was a member of the Partus Church and he organized the church at Turan, Italy in 237 A. D. (Armitage Church History, p. 182).

Tellestman from Turan Church organized the Pontifessi Church at the foot of the Alps in France in 398 A. D. (Newlin's Church History, vol. 2, p. 318).

Adromicus came from the Pontifessi Church and organized the Darthea Church in Asia Minor in 671 A. D. (Lambert's Church History, p. 47).

Archer Flavin came from the Darthea Church and organized the Timte Church in Asia Minor in 738 A. D. (Mesheim's History, vol. 1, p. 394).

Balcalao came from the Timto Church and organized the Lima Piedmont Church in 812 A. D. (Neander's Church History, vol. 2, p. 320).

Aaron Arlington was ordained by the Lima Piedmont Church in 940 A. D. (Jones' Church History, p. 324) and he went and organized the Hillcliff Church in Wales, England 987 A. D. (Alex Munston's Israel of the Alps, p. 39).

H. Roller of the Hillcliff Church came to the Philadelphia Baptist Association in America which was organized on July 27, 1707, with five churches. One of these was the Welsh Tract Church. (Baptist Enc., Cathcart, vol. 2, p. 916).

From the Welsh Tract Baptist Church the Welsh Neck Baptist Church was organized in South Carolina, January, 1738. (Benedict, p. 705).

"The Welsh Neck Church is the oldest and may be considered the mother of all others in this region." (Benedict, P. 706). From the South Carolina Baptists

came Elders John Hightower, Joseph Logan and Alexander Devin and organized Old Union Baptist Church in Warren County, Ky. in 1795. (History Middle Tenn. Baptists by J. H. Grime, p.p. 2, 52).

From Old Union Church in Warren County, Ky. came members and organized Calvary Baptist Church, Carthage, Tenn. on April 23, 1967. (Baptist Banner, vol. 2, No. 1, p. 1).

other was much younger, jumped up and
gazed at me. I asked them if they are of
one sect of Buddhist. That is very
notorious one. They quickly disappeared
in the dark leaving me without any
words. I don't know if they belong to the
group which gives us threatening phone
calls.

Seven people got saved and made public profession of faith. The youngest one is 15 years old girl and the oldest one is 66 years old man. We praise His name that these people got saved from sin and do have eternal life now. I want to mention, I humbly say, that you have a great part of their conversion. I would like for you to remember them in prayer that they may grow in the grace of God and be missionary Baptists. Bro. Hotta and I withdrew all the signboards and posters and everything out in the town after last meeting. I came home at midnight and fell asleep. I slept over twenty hours without knowing anything. And this backed me up.

I have some other good news that Lord had written. I will tell you of it in my next letter.

We had a service at the house on Thursday night, and we had a good time in the Lord. Mourice and Ann profess to be saved, but they, like most believers in this country, have been led about by every kind of doctrine. They need so much to be grounded in the faith. Maybe, since they are young, we might be able to help them. We have requested your prayers before for them, and again we ask for your prayers. We intend to visit them again within a few days.

The Arab girl, whose name is Taghreed, comes to visit us once a week, and we try to instruct her to live a true Christian life and have prayer with us. This girl has a real experience, and her life shows a great change. Is is such joy for us when she comes to fellowship with us. It has been a great blessing to us to have had a little part in leading her to the Lord. Of course all the honor and the glory is the Lord's, but we can share the joy; and oh, what a joy it is!



EDITOR ON TOUR OF BIBLE LANDS

Wednesday. Dec. 1-Tour in Turkey including Antioch, Iskenderum, and Tarsus. Thursday, Dec. 2-Will tour Lebanon and continue into Syria where Damascus will be visited and studied. Friday, Dec. 3 through Monday, Dec. 6, will tour Israel. Leave Israel on the night of Dec. 6 for Cyprus. Tuesday, Dec. 7-Arrive at the city of Limassel and then travel to Necesia Airport where the group will aboard a Overseas National Airways Jet to fly to New York and then on to Louisville, Ky.
